What We Learnt Last Week?

- Sin is not a light issue in God's eyes; God is not like us Psalm 50:16-21
- Man died: spiritual death and SEPARATION from God Genesis 2:16-17

Background/Introduction

- In Genesis 3:16-21, four things can be learned from this passage:
 - 1. In order for a sinner to come before a holy God, he needs a covering.
 - 2. Human works or coverings are worthless-not sufficient (Isaiah 64:6).
 - 3. God Himself must provide a suitable covering.
 - The God-given covering was obtained by the shedding of blood of an innocent substitute.
- In Genesis 3 we see the beginning of sin in man, in Genesis 4 we read of its fruits.
- In Genesis 3 the sin was against God, in Genesis 4 it is against a fellow-man.
- Genesis 4 we see the local fulfilment of Genesis 3:15 the enmity between the two seeds - the wicked and the righteous, Cain and Abel.
- Like leprosy, sin contaminates, spreads and results in death (Romans 6:23; Leviticus 13:8-52).
- The account of Cain and Abel in these verses seems to be very simple, but it is full of deep meaning.
- And every one of us should MEDIDATE upon this passage, for it explains a great deal about sin and salvation.
- Furthermore, everyone here this evening is either like Cain (He is called "of the wicked one" in 1 John 3:12) or like Abel (Hebrews 11:4). There are NO EXCEPTIONS! Which one of them do you resemble? Examine yourself and Meditate!

A closer look at Cain and Abel (Similarities)

 They were both children of fallen parents. Both of them were born outside of the Garden of Eden after the Fall, after God pronounced a curse on the human race, after their parents had been driven out of the Garden (Romans 5:12).



- Thus, both Cain and Abel were born in sin, "and were by nature the children of wrath" (Ephesians 2:3; Psalms 51:5). Both of them had depraved natures that were opposed to God," (Rom 8:7; John 3:19).
- As such, both had been shaped in iniquity and conceived by sin, and both needed salvation by God in Christ (1 Corinthians 15:21-22).
- They had the same heredity and environment, in the same home, with the same parents.

A closer look at Cain and Abel (Differences)

- Cain's way is the way of **UNBELIEF**, while Abel's way is the way of **FAITH**.
- What is FAITH? Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen (Heb 11:1; Romans 10:17; Heb 12:2).
- Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God (Romans 10:17).
- Faith is a GIFT of GRACE from God (Ephesians 2:8-9) and man contributes nothing to his salvation. God does it all!
- Faith is **NOT** only believing in facts. Even the demons believes there is God! (James 2:19, Genesis 15:6).
- Faith **motivates** me to live in accordance with God's ways (Hebrews 11).
- The **SAME** grace that saves me causes me to say, "NO" to ungodliness. (Titus 2:11-12). Grace causes me to **REPENT**! Always and continually.
- True faith WORKS! Faith without works is dead (James 2:20,24).
- Faith justifies! (Romans 5:1). Faith tells me that God justifies.
- Faith purifies the heart. (Acts 15:9)
- Faith works by love (Galatians 5:6) and avails everything in God.
- Faith overcomes the world (1 John 5:4) by God given faith.
- Cain denied his ruined and fallen condition and did not come to God in HIS WAY by a
 blood sacrifice. But Abel acknowledged his sinfulness, believed God's word,
 expressed his faith in a bloody sacrificial substitute for his sin, and was thus seen as
 a righteous man in the sight of God by faith alone, in Christ alone.
- Abel had faith while Cain did not have faith. It was through Abel's faith that he brought a blood sacrifice to God. "Without faith-impossible to please God" (Hebrews 11:6).
- To Adam and Eve, God demonstrated the basic truth of substitution the innocent dying for the guilty. Adam and Eve were guilty...but an animal died in their place and by its death a covering was provided to hide their sin and shame (Genesis 3:21).
- So, it is with Christ and the elect. In Christ, a robe of righteousness is provided for the elect. These requirements were made known to their children (Genesis 4:3).
- Cain represents the natural man, the man who is not in Christ, and is not washed clean in His Blood, and thus does not have his sins covered (1 Corinthians 2:14).
- Abel represents the man who acknowledges his sin, sees himself as a depraved sinner, and so comes to Jesus for cleansing in His precious Blood. Those who refuse to come to Christ for cleansing have a woe pronounced against them by God - "Woe unto them! for they have gone in the way of Cain" (Jude 11). MEDITATE!
- Cain's way is the way of one's own WORKS in trying to please God, while Abel's way is TRUSTING in the works of Christ.
- Our salvation MUST be of faith a gift from God. (Hebrews 11:6; Eph 2:8-9).
- Cain's way is WITHOUT BLOOD while Abel's way is WITH BLOOD.
- Cain's way is the way of RELIGION, while Abel's way is an INTIMATE RELATIONSHIP

Cain's Offering (Genesis 4:1-6)

- · Cain was a religious man
 - Cain was **conscious** of his duty toward God.
 - Cain was the first to bring his offering.
 - Cain offered his offering as an act of worship.
 - Cain was a hard-working man.
 - Cain brought the fruit of his labour.
- Cain committed the same offense as his parents: UNBELIEF.
- Cain substituted his opinion for the TRUTH.
- Though his offering was sincere, God found Cain's offering unacceptable. It did not please God.
- Cain was cursed by God and went out from the presence of God (Gen 4:11).

Abel's Offering

- Abel brought the "firstling" (the firstborn) of his flock.
- Abel brought an innocent substitute a picture of Jesus Christ.
- Abel knew that blood had to be shed (Hebrews 9:22).
- Abel brought his offering unto the Lord in faith. Faith comes from hearing and doing the Word of God (Romans 10:17).
- Abel put BLOOD between himself and God. God found Abel's offering acceptable.
- · With ABEL's offering, we can learn two things:
 - 1. God revealed His will.
 - 2. Abel acted on that will.

Abel's Excellent Offering (Hebrews 11:4)

- Abel's offering was offered in **obedience** to God's revealed will. God accepts NOTHING that He has not stipulated or commanded (Colossians 2:23).
- Abel's offering was by faith. This means that it was much more than just a performance. It was NOT by imagination, feelings, traditions or customs.
 - Faith and obedience always go together. It wasn't Abel's "obedience" that saved him - it was his "faith" - which was itself a gift, "not of works, lest any man should boast" (Ephesians 2:9).
 - Obedience is a fruit of salvation, not the cause of it. Obedience comes after one is saved by faith in Christ. (Romans 1:5; 16:26; Acts 6:7; 2 Corinthians 10:4-6; Hebrews 3:18-19; 5:9; 2 Thessalonians 1:8-9; James 2:14.)
 - Faith looks at the promise and obedience looks at the command.
 - Anything not done in faith is sin (Romans 14:23).

God assured Abel (Hebrews 11:4)

- God gave witness; God testified; God gave the report that Abel was righteous.
- Those who HEAR God and ACT faithfully according to His precepts can have the assurance that they are righteous in the sight of God (John 14:15-24; Matthew 7:21)
- God honours those who honour Him! (1 Samuel 2:30)
- There is a **GREAT REWARD** in keeping God's commandments (Psalm 19:11 Heb 11:6).

Abel as a Type (Picture) of Christ

1	Abel was a shepherd who looked after his sheep.	Jesus was/is the true Shepherd who looks after His sheep (John 10:11)
2	Abel offered an acceptable offering to God.	Christ, as our High Priest, offered an acceptable offering (Hebrews 10:12)
3	Abel was hated by his own brother, Cain, without proper cause.	Jesus was hated by His brothers and brethren in Israel without cause. (John 15:25)
4	Abel was martyred by his brother and died because of his brother's sin.	Jesus was rejected by His own brothers and delivered up to die by His own people. (John 1:11; 7:5)
5	The blood of Abel cries out to God. Abel's blood cried out to God for justice .	Jesus' blood is said to cry out but it speaks a better word than the blood of Abel (Heb 12:24). Jesus' blood cries out for mercy .

- ✓ Cain is a type of the religious Jews. Cain hated Abel and killed him because he was jealous of Abel's righteous act and acceptance with God.
- ✓ In like manner, the religious Jews of Christ's time hated Jesus because He exposed their self-righteous acts before God. And so, they killed Jesus as Cain killed Abel.

What is the Only Proper Response?

- Serve and worship God the way He has revealed in His word (Deuteronomy 29:29).
- Repent today and continuously repent Acts 17:30-31; Acts 20:21; Luke 13:1-5; Luke 24:47
- Believe God with all your heart (mind, will, and emotions) and grow your relationship with Him - Acts 8:37; John 3:18, 36; 1 Chronicles 28:9; Jeremiah 9:23-24; Daniel 11:32
- Submit to Christ as Lord (Owner, Master, Ruler, Creator) Romans 10:9-10; Psalm 2:10-12; Matthew 7:21-23
- Glorify God for all He has done, is doing, and has promised to do Psalm 115:1-3;
 Revelations 4:9-11
- Remain humble and seek the LORD 1 Peter 5:5, Matthew 11:28-29, James 4:6, Proverbs 3:5-7.
- Give God our BEST/ALL because GOD gave His BEST. Remember God's first commandment - Matthew 22:37.
